The 3 "R's" REDUCE - REUSE - RECYCLE

REDUCE:

Limit the amount of waste you dispose of by being conscious and AWARE of what happens with the item after you use it. Think of buying a plastic water bottle and instead of buying another one once you've finished drinking the liquid inside, refill the bottle with water again. The plastic grocery bags can be used for bathroom trash bags. Each of these examples cut back the amount of material in the waste stream.

REUSE:

Items can be used for other things. One example is a peanut butter jar. After eating the peanut butter, take a little time and rinse out the bottle. The bottle can be used for storing of small items like bolts, nuts, paper clips, or anything else that will fit. Donate cloths that are no longer worn.

RECYCLE:

Recycling saves energy, water and land, by diverting items away from landfills. This contributes to A BETTER QUALITY OF LIFE.

Recycling is the process of diverting a material away from landfills and making it available to manufacturers who can produce a new product out of it. This process SAVES energy, raw materials, water, and reduces the amount of pollutants in the air.

WHAT TO RECYCLE:

Paper: newspaper, junk mail shredded paper, magazines, phone books, office paper, and most other paper material

Plastics (#1 - #7): drink containers, milk jugs, and detergent.

- empty all liquids
- remove lids

Single Stream: plastic, paper and cardboard. **Styrofoam:** Publix Grocery, Canton

Plastic Bags: plastic shopping bags can be taken to Kroger, Walmart, Ingles & The Community Thrift Store

Glass: drinkable glass bottles of all colors including green, brown, blue, and clear

- empty all liquids

Cardboard/Pasteboard: cereal boxes, and detergent boxes as well as cardboard boxes

 no cardboard with coated exterior (milk cartons)

Metals: aluminum cans, tin cans, steel cans, as well as brass and copper plus any large metal items

- rinse out any contaminants prior to recycling
- remove motor oil or antifreeze from appliances

E-waste: any electric item with electrical components (old fax machines, computers, flat screens, etc)

Miscellaneous: used motor oil and scrap tires

- remove rims on tires
- we do NOT take motor oil bottles



NON RECYCLABLE:

- Paper products contaminated with food (napkins, paper plates, etc)
- Plastic liners from food packaging
- Wax paper and other coated paper with wax, milk cartsons
- Light bulbs (non energy efficient), mirrors, and styrofoam

Pickens Recycling Center on Cove Road (770-893-2644) No charge to recycle

- 9720 Cove Rd., Marble Hill On the south side of Cove Rd just west of Steve Tate Hwy.
- Currently open 8:00am -5:00pm Tuesday Saturday
- Recyclables must be separated: steel, aluminum, three colors of glass separated, plastic, cardboard, and mixed paper.
- This facility accepts bagged garbage for a fee per bag.

<u>Pickens County Recycling Center at Camp Road</u> (706-253-8871) No charge to recycle

- 3141 Camp Rd., Jasper East of Hwy 515
- Currently open 8:00am 5:00pm Tuesday Saturday.
- Recyclables must be separated : steel, aluminum, four colors of glass
- Single stream you no longer have to separate plastic, paper, cardboard or mixed paper-separated, plastic, also has a dump facility for bagged garbage for a fee per bag.

Self Recycling Center Stanley Road 866-318-5876

 Currently open Monday and Tuesday 8:00 am to 4:30 pm closed Wed - Thursday and Friday 8:00 am to 4:30, Saturday 8:00 am to 11:30 am, Self pays for some recycles — No glass please

- Currently open 8:00am 5:00pm Mon.-Fri. Closed Saturday & Sunday.
 Construction/demolition debris, steel, gloss, pipe, concrete, asphalt, rock, soil, gypsum wallboard, lumber, bricks, pallets, cardboard, metal scrap, wood waste, plastics, aluminum, shingles, paper, asbestos.

K&M Inert landfill (706-253-3300) Call for rates/ details

- Currently open 8:00am 5:00pm Mon.-Fri., Closed Saturday & Sunday All inert materials Yard trimmings, stumps, limbs, leaves, concrete, cured asphalt, rock, bricks

GEORGIA RECYCLING FACTS:

- If just one-tenth of the newspapers is recycled, we would save about 25,000,000 trees a year.
- The trees saved (above) can absorb a total of 250 pounds of carbon dioxide from the air each year. Burning that same ton of paper would create 1500 pounds of carbon dioxide.
- There is no limit to the amount of times an aluminum can may be recycled.
- A modern glass bottle would take 4000 years or more to decompose and even longer if it's in the landfill.



RECYCLING SAVES:

- Land use for landfills is minimized.
- Recycling saves trees, water, and other natural resources.
- Electricity to manufacture items using recycled material is much less.
- Reduces the impact on our natural surroundings.
